From The Pastors Desk...

Brian McLaren writes a lot about the motivations each of us tend to have that cause us to value our Christian faith. But more than that, McLaren says, we do more than simply value our Christian faith. We tend, as Christians to believe that "our" faith and the way we live it gives us a quality...and **that quality we think is supremacy over other religions.** If and when we calculate we are "good", faithful Christians, it is easy for us to slip into the drainage ditch of feeling that precisely because we are "good" Christians **we are superior** to others...all others.

The parable of the "Good Samaritan" offers a way of thinking about this temptation to think of ourselves as superior to all others. (Luke 10) A priest and a Levite are traveling down the same road. This is not a surprise because Levites were people who assisted the priests in worship and in all of the duties of a priest.

The minister (the priest) and his helper (the Levite) are focused like a laser on whether or not they are "good", "faithful" believers in the religion of the Jews in Jesus day. Among many other things, this meant they did not want to touch the body of any person who was made "unclean". An "unclean" person could not by definition be a "good" and "faithful" believer if she or he was "unclean".

One way a person was made "unclean" in those days was to have blood on the body. It didn't make any difference how the blood got to be on the body...it could be an accidental cut, a scratch from a tree branch, a medical condition no matter how natural, a fight, or blood from another person's body. Just the presence of blood made a person "unclean". And that made that person untouchable by authentic, true believers of the faith.

So, when the priest and the Levite saw an injured bleeding person lying along the side of the road the "clean" and superior "believers" in the faith made every possible effort to bypass the injured neighbor.

Then, so the story goes, along came a Samaritan — a "dirty half-Gentile" to use the biblical language. The Samaritan cares more about his injured neighbor than about remaining "clean". The Samaritan focuses on helping the injured neighbor.

Then Jesus comes to the point: caring for another the way the "dirty half-gentile" did is what it means to live by the greatest commandment.

Living by the greatest commandment as Jesus Christ describes it means forgetting about getting or remaining "clean" in order to live the perfect religious life. Rather it means dethroning those beliefs and ways of living that allow or cause us to believe we are superior to all of those who are "unclean". Living by the greatest commandment in Jesus' view means to get rid of all of those ways of thinking about ourselves and our faith that lead us to see ourselves as superior to those whose beliefs are different....those who are the "unclean" of the world...and stopping to help and care for each one of them wherever we meet them.

As we begin this new year, may we each resolve to live out our faith according to Christ's call to live by the greatest commandment.

Financial Information:





Annually, the Presbytery works out a per capita offering for all churches belonging to the Presbyterian Community. This is due in January of each year. "Per Capita" is an organizational expense of the Presbytery. It pays for the operation of the governing bodies of the Presbytery as well as the promotion of worldwide Christian unity. The amount that is set for per capita is based on the number of members in each church of the Presbytery. Fairgreen's per capita for 2023 is \$2,895.00 based on 75 members on our roster (our number from 2021 year end.) That is \$38.60 per capita for
